

Getting started Break the ice by reading this question aloud and letting your imaginations take flight.

Imagine that you have been asked to design a place for people to pray that is unlike any other space anyone has ever seen. Describe it in as much detail as possible. Would it be quiet, lively, modern, historic, bright, or dark? What kind of furniture would your prayer space need? How would your place help people pray?

exploring the theme

Take turns reading the statements below one at a time. Before moving to the next one, take a minute to tell what you've experienced about that statement in your own life. Tell a story that illustrates what you've experienced.

- 1. All you need for prayer are God and yourself. You can always count on God to be present. Are you present?
- God loves being with you. You're not bothering God when you turn to him in prayer.
- 3. God always understands what you mean. You don't have to worry about saying it right. In fact, you don't have to say anything. Just show God your mind and your heart.

- 4. God ever and always wants to give you what's best for you. Sometimes God just gives you things. Sometimes God waits for you to ask. ASK! Pester God! You may not get the response you expect, but trust God to do what is really best for you.
- 5. You can talk with God while doing other things. You can pray while doing homework, riding in a car, when you're with friends, or even in the middle of a difficult situation. God is always there to listen and respond.
- 6. At some point every day, let yourself think that God loves you more than anyone else can. (It's true.) You can do this before you get out of bed in the morning. Take a little time to receive and enjoy the love God longs to send you.

When you've read and talked about all six principles, think about which of these you'll each want to practice in the days to come.

life lesson | the kingdom of heaven is like . . .

Jesus would often talk about the Kingdom of Heaven, describing it as a banquet, a wedding feast, a mustard seed, or a treasure hidden in a field. When I hear Jesus use analogies and stories to tell spiritual truths, it often evokes a story in me. Here's a story of how I got a glimpse of what that kingdom might be like.

Back when I was a kid, my dad taught a religious education class for eighth grade boys. They were a rowdy bunch, and Dad tried every way he could to reach them. When Advent came, our parish ran a food-and-toy drive for people in need. Dad made this his group's number—one priority and became a cheerleader for bringing in canned goods, condiments, cleaning supplies, games, and toys. The boys responded with surprising generosity. On a snowy day in December, I joined my dad, a few other adults, and his class of rowdies to help deliver shopping bags of food and boxes of home supplies and toys to half a dozen families in a parish across town.

All of us boys were nervous entering an unfamiliar neighborhood, but Dad was at ease. He greeted each person we met as a long-lost relative. When someone would invite us in, he'd eagerly accept, and in one apartment we stayed a while. I remember the boys from my parish playing with the five or six kids in the living room and all of us eating homemade cookies. Meanwhile Dad and the parents sat in the dining room, sipping coffee and telling stories—sometimes laughing, sometimes with eyes brimming with tears. The people we visited stopped being "the needy" and became family who shared with us as we shared with them.

I learned that day that you cannot possess the Kingdom of God; you can only enter into it. The keys to this kingdom are compassion, solidarity, and love.

conversation SIX

the big idea

WHAT IS HEAVEN? For thousands

of years people, have wondered what Heaven is like, and there are plenty of jokes about people arriving at the "pearly gates." But it's important to realize that when we pray "Our Father, who art in heaven," this biblical expression does not refer to a particular place, but a way of being. It refers to God's way of being and his invitation to us to live that way too. This way of being encompasses many elements, including taking on the vision of God, participation in divine nature, eternal life, and closeness to God.

Placing God in Heaven doesn't mean that God is distant, but majestic. In fact, Jesus revealed that the Kingdom of Heaven is at hand. (Matthew 10:7) Our heavenly Father is not "elsewhere," but in the hearts of those who are humble and contrite.

The Church points to the pathways by which we enter the Kingdom of Heaven. We have the Ten Commandments to guide us, the Beatitudes to inspire us, and the teachings of the Church to sustain us on our way. The clearest revelation of how we may enter the Kingdom of Heaven appears in the example, teachings, life, and death of Jesus.

Heaven, or communion with God, is the state of being that we long for the most. Chapter one, paragraph 27 of the Catechism of the Catholic Church begins, "The desire for God is written in the human heart." The fulfillment of that desire is eternal life with God in Heaven. St. Catherine of Siena said, "All the way to heaven is heaven." And so along the way as we align our will to God's will for us, we will get glimpses of that glory and tastes of that divine union.

Concluding Rite

The end of every Mass is also a new beginning. The Confirmation Mass ends with a final blessing by the bishop that acknowledges this truth. He will extend his hand over all the people gathered and pray that the Gifts of the Holy Spirit will motivate everyone present to live out the Gospel of Christ. He'll say these words of blessing:

God our Father,
complete the work you have begun
and keep the gifts of your Holy Spirit
active in the hearts of your people.
Make them ready to live his Gospel
and eager to do his will.
May they never be ashamed
to proclaim to all the world Christ crucified
living and reigning for ever and ever. Amen.






